Come and Worship

Our Lenten journey reaches its climax and culmination in the eight days framed by Palm / Passion Sunday and The Resurrection of Our Lord, Easter Sunday.

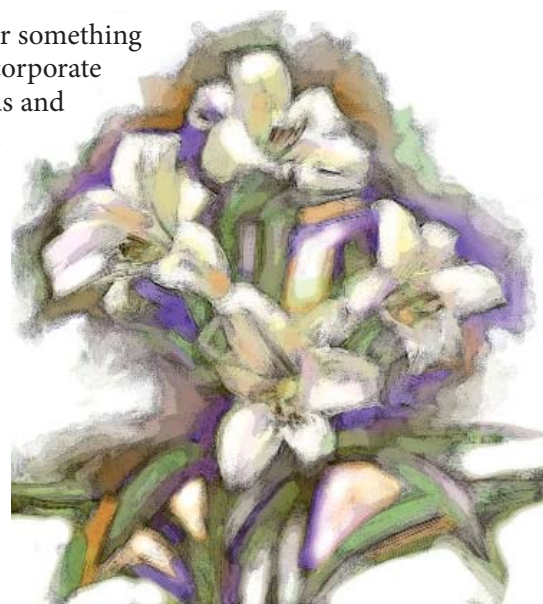
Sunday, April 17th, Palm/Passion Sunday begins with shouts of "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord" and moves quickly into the reading of the complete passion narrative from Matthew's gospel. The congregation for 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. will assemble in the alley on the west side of the church, receive palms branches, and process around to enter the building from the east side.

Holy Week this year will introduce an opportunity for additional devotion. On Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday there will be a contemplative service of scripture reading, prayer, and meditation in the chapel. There will be no music, sermon, or sacrament, and no lunch served. This is simply an opportunity offered for individuals to step away from the rush of daily life to prepare hearts and minds for the events of "The Three Days".

Maundy Thursday at St. John's will also offer something old but new to us - the opportunity for corporate confession and individual laying on of hands and the pronouncement of absolution. This will be available in the chapel at 11:30 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. one half hour prior to the 12:05 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. services. The services themselves will be held in the sanctuary with Holy Communion and, at 7:30 p.m., rituals of footwashing and the stripping of the altar.

Good Friday, in many ways, contains the most confounding and offensive part of the Christian gospel: that divinity not only became human, but in that human form

A Word from Our Pastors

“He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?” Micah 6:8

I think part of walking humbly with God means that we can laugh at ourselves and the situations we find ourselves in at times.

I will not forget an older fellow who supervised a cottage of delinquent teenagers. These kids were grumpy, and smiles and laughter were seldom heard or seen in their home. So Mr. Brown, the cottage father, would encourage them saying, “Smile - and they will think you are up to something.” It seemed to help make things better.

Psalm 2:4 says, “He who sits in the heavens laughs; the Lord has them in derision.” Again, in Psalm 59:8-10, “But you laugh at them, O Lord; you hold all the nations in derision. O my strength, I will watch for you; for you, O God, are my fortress. My God in his steadfast love will meet me; my God will let me look in triumph on my enemies.”

I am glad to have the opportunity to share some information about your 2011 church council. Each quarter, I plan to bring you an update on our work and plans for the year. First, let me say that we have a very talented group of people. We are active and passionate about our involvement at St. John's and excited to be part of this church and its ministry. Everyone has expressed that

we have a vibrant healthy church that understands its mission of preaching the gospel, supporting each other in community, and making deep personal connections. Worship at St. John's is engaging, we have people of all ages (including youth) involved, great music and the arts, and our many outreach programs really live up to "in the city for good".

Next for some good financial news. Our giving is trending upward. We have received more Estimates of Giving and Simply Giving cards for 2011 than last year. Prepare for Worship

Sunday, April 3 Fourth Sunday in Lent

Baptism is sometimes called enlightenment. The gospel for this Sunday is the story of the man born blind healed by Christ. "I was blind, but now I see," declares the man. In baptism God opens our eyes to see the truth of who we are: God's beloved sons and daughters.

The readings are 1 Samuel 16:1-13; Psalm 23; Ephesians 5:8-14; and John 9:1-41. The hymns are ELW 673, "God, Whose Almighty Word," ELW 637, "Holy God, Holy and Glorious," and ELW 768, "Lead Me, Guide me." At 8:45 Kisasa Choristers will sing "Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us," by William Bradley Roberts for offering and, during communion, Amy Walman Madden with Asphalt & Stained Glass will sing "I Quietly Turned to You," by Buryl Red. At 11:00 a.m., our Cathedral Choir and Chamber Orchestra will present "Be Thou My Vision" in a setting by John Ness Beck for offering, and "Open My Eyes," by K. Lee Scott during communion.

Beginning Sunday, April 3, there will be a station for laying on of hands and anointing for healing available in the east transept every 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. service during communion.

Sunday, April 10 Fifth Sunday in Lent

In today's gospel Jesus reveals his power over death by raising Lazarus from the dead. The prophet Ezekiel prophesies God breathing new life into dry bones. To those in exile or living in the shadows of death, these stories proclaim God's promise of resurrection. In baptism we die with Christ that we might also be raised with him to new life.

The readings are Ezekiel 37:1-14; Psalm 130; Romans 8:6-11, and John 11:1-45. The hymns are ELW 333, "Lead Me, Guide Me," ELW 637, "Holy God, Holy and Glorious," and ELW 758, "You Are the Way." At 8:45 a.m. Cantorei and Cathedral Choir will sing, "I Am the Resurrection and the Life," for double choir by Heinrich Schutz. At both 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Larry Christensen with A&SG will sing a setting of Psalm 130, "De Profundis Blues," by Paul Wellicome for communion, and at 11:00 a.m. Paul and Susan Stageberg will sing the offering music. There will be laying on of hands and anointing with oil for healing at all services this weekend.

Sunday, April 17th Sunday of the Passion / Palm Sunday

This day's liturgy begins with a palm procession beginning outdoors, commemorating Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Quickly the tone of the service changes as we meditate upon Jesus' passion and death. Because this story is so central to our faith, our only reading will be Matthew's account of the passion: Matthew 26:1 – 27:66. The congregation will participate in the reading using booklets with the entire text.

The hymns will be ELW 334, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," ELW 343, "My Song is Love Unknown," and ELW 354, "Calvary." The Kisasa Choristers will sing at 8:45 a.m. and Cathedral Choir at 11:00 a.m.

Sunday, April 24th Resurrection of Our Lord / Easter Day

On this day the Lord has acted! On the first day of the week God began creation, transforming darkness into light. On this, the "eighth day" of the week, Jesus Christ was raised from the dead. We celebrate this new creation in the waters of baptism and in the feast of victory. With great joy we celebrate this day of days, even as we begin the great fifty days of Easter. Filled with hope, we go forth to share the news that Christ is risen!

The readings are Acts 10:34-43 (or Jeremiah 31:1-6); Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24; Colossians 3:1-4; and Matthew 28:1-10 (or John 20:1-18) The hymns are ELW 365, "Jesus Christ is Risen Today," ELW 449, "We Know That Christ is Raised and Dies No More," and "The Day of Resurrection." There will be three services: 6:30 a.m., 8:45 a.m., and 11:00 a.m.

The tone of the 6:30 a.m. Sunrise Communion service will be joyful, lyric, and gentle led by Sarah Garner on organ and piano. At 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. we will be in full-voiced festival mode with organ, brass, orchestra, bells, percussion, Cantorei, and Cathedral Choir. At 8:45 a.m. the Kisasa Choristers will sing "Alleluia" by W.A. Mozart. The choirs and instrumentalists will join baritone Mark Garner in presenting three of Ralph Vaughan Williams' famous "Five Mystical Songs" on Easter poems by George Herbert. There is communion at all services.

Health Ministry



Good health, understood to include body, mind and spirit pervades scripture and is focal to Jesus' teachings. From a biblical perspective, healing is a part of the process of living and, as such, it is not reserved strictly for the sick but helps all focus on wholeness, God's intention for His people.

St. John's has long designated the third Sunday of the month as a day to emphasize wholeness with the laying on of hands and prayer. Beginning in April this ministry is being expanded to every Sunday at the 8:45 and 11:00 services when there will be a healing minister located in the east transept for those desiring to participate. As you leave the communion rail, you may stop at a kneeler where the health minister will be available.

We have need for additional health ministers to allow us to provide this ministry. If anyone would like to serve in this capacity, please call Katie at the church office. There will be a short class after Easter for the training.

submitted to humiliation, torture, and death at the hands of religious and political powers of this world. That was beyond acceptance for religious folk of the time and for some to this day even as it is also taken for granted, or of little importance. Yet this passion narrative, from the gospel of John, reads us and our lives as we hear it read and sung. The services are 12:05 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. in the sanctuary.

The Easter Vigil, concluding Holy Saturday and ushering in Easter, is the hinge into and the first celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord. It begins in the courtyard with the striking of a new fire, the lighting of the new Paschal Candle, and a procession into the church with individual candles lighted from that one flame. The service in the chapel includes four dramatic readings from the Biblical salvation history, remembrance of our baptism, and communion. Bring a bell to ring!

The Resurrection of Our Lord/Easter

6:30 a.m. will have the gentle quality of a peaceful yet exciting sunrise with music on organ and piano by Sarah Garner, preaching, and Holy Communion.

8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. will be identical services with music by Cantorei and Cathedral Choir, brass, organ, and orchestra. The liturgy will be as festive as we can make it with processions, shouted and sung "Alleluias", banners and bells, white and gold paraments, gospel preaching, and communal eating of the sacrament of the table, the holy fellowship in which we are one body, the Body of Jesus Christ, our Lord.

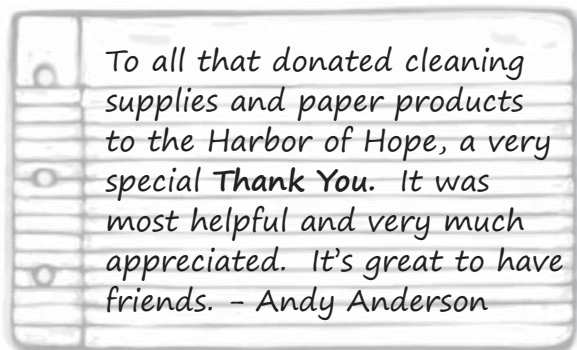
Be generous!

TZ11 Recap

On February 15, 2011 seven enthusiastic travelers from St. John's left Des Moines to visit our companion congregation in Tanzania, the Mramba Lutheran Parish, for the third time. Our flights took us first to Amsterdam, then over the Swiss Alps, the Sahara, the equator and, finally, to Kilimanjaro Airport near Arusha, TZ. As we walked from the plane into the terminal, we looked up to see star-studded Tanzania skies. Since this is the land where our ancestors first walked upright, there is always a sense of returning "home"...

After a good night's sleep and a leisurely breakfast at Uhuru Hostel in Moshi, we exchanged our dollars for TZ shillings (\$1 = 1490 Tanzania shillings) and were on our way to Same (pronounced "sa-may") by early afternoon.

Our first visit was with Bishop Mjema, the newly-elected Bishop of the Pare Diocese in Same. We had an excellent

conversation with the Bishop and Mr. Tumaini Chambua regarding our partnership with Mramba Parish, a more in-depth conversation than we have had before with diocese staff. It is very clear that education of the children and youth of the Pare Diocese is of great importance to the bishop. The Diocese is very interested in how the Children's Club established in Mramba for the Most Vulnerable Children is progressing. This Children's Club is looked upon as a pilot program for all other parishes wishing to establish something similar. The bishop is also interested in setting up a scholarship program for vulnerable children to go to secondary school and in building or repairing a girl's school in Pare.

Later, as we relaxed at the Elephant Hotel, the coach of a local children's soccer team came by to meet Jim Hammer and collect the 35 soccer shirts and 11 soccer balls Jim had brought for the local teams. It was quite a sight to see the coach climb onto his bicycle and head down the driveway with 35 shirts and 11 balls in a bag on his back. His smile said it all!

On Friday, we loaded up our treasures and headed up the mountain to Mramba Parish to meet the new Pastor, Justin Mchome, and our host families. It is exciting to be so warmly welcomed by old and new friends. Some of us stayed with the host families we met during our first trip in 2008, so it truly was like coming home. The hospitality we experience at Mramba is beyond compare, and once you have made the journey, you will understand what we mean.

Saturday was devoted to the official opening of the Most Vulnerable Children's Club which is held at Vuje Primary School just a short walk down the mountain from the church. There we met 50 beautiful faces singing welcome songs in English. The children had written a poem about their experiences, and also a drama about a girl who received the opportunity to attend the Children's Club. The drama reflected the lives of each one of the children there, and portrayed a girl praying for someone to help her so that she could attend school. The prayer was answered through the Children's Club. The program teaches children life skills, supplementing what they learn in school (if they attend school), provides two nutritious meals and a snack, and also helps the children help their families. The children have planted a 12' x 20' garden with trench irrigation and were already growing beans! The food will be used on Saturdays, and the extra will be sent home with the children. Pastor Rachel officially opened the Most Vulnerable Children's Club after a festive lunch, and presented the newly-trained teachers with graduation certificates...It was an amazing day! St. John's will provide financial support for the Children's Club (in partnership with Empower Tanzania, Inc.) when other start-up funding comes to an end this summer.

Sunday was devoted to worship - 3 hrs and 45 minutes - fellowship, and Sunday School. Four offerings were received during worship, and the usual auction was held in the churchyard immediately following the service. This particular Sunday brought a live chicken to the auction, which sat very quietly near the pulpit during most of worship. However, near the end of the service, the chicken grew tired, began to cluck, and nearly escaped its basket! (Pastor Mithelman bought the chicken at the auction and presented it to the pastor's wife...)

Monday we spent visiting Mgombo sub-parish and briefly helped move stones for the construction of a retaining wall. St. John's has contributed funds for the expansion of the church building at Mgombo, and new walls have been built and they are preparing to put on the new roof. We also visited some secondary schools and Dindimo Teachers Training College that afternoon, and ended the day with a brief visit to Gonja Hospital. We delivered 25 baby quilts (made by a member of St. John's) and toured the hospital.

Our time in Mramba came to an end with a farewell meal and thank-you speeches on Tuesday. We returned to Same that afternoon. Five of the members of our group then spent a few days with coffee farmers on the slopes of Kilimanjaro, before we were reunited for visits to two other projects - the Usangi Leadership Institute and a safe motherhood project in a remote Masai village.

Our last day was spent at Ngorongoro Crater, which was green and full of animals - zebras, giraffes, elephants, lions and even a couple of cheetahs! On the evening of March 1, we boarded the plane for our long journey home, arriving safely the next evening.

Our travelers will be presenting photos and more information on this most recent visit to Mramba Parish in the weeks ahead. Please feel free to ask questions and, consider joining the next group to visit Mramba in 2012!
